### **Create a New Library**


**File** —> **New.** Name your library. We recommend that you have one library. Choose an easy naming strategy: *lastname\_LutherThesis\_mmddyyyy*.enl OR *yourchoicehere*.enl. (.enl = endnote library)



**Back up** your library each time you add resources. Save it to a flash drive, email it to yourself, or upload to your Google Drive. 
#### Four Parts to the EndNote Window

- 1. My Library, My Groups, Online Search
- 2. Online Search Interface
- 3. References (entries in your library)
- 4. Preview, Attachments & Quick Edit window



## **Select the Correct Output Style**

Choose your **output style**. This determines how your data will look. We use a style based on Chicago 16A, that creates both footnote and bibliography entries. Do you have the most *recent* version from the library's Endnote web site? Place it into your Styles folder.



#### Add New References – Two Methods

**Manual entry**: Open a new reference data window. Try one of the following:

a) Click on this icon



- b) Ctrl + N
- c) References —> New Reference

Choose your reference type: Are you adding a book, journal article, website, etc. This determines the correct data fields. Enter the basic data: creator, title, date, publisher, etc.

## Import via an online search

- a) Use either the **Online Search Mode** (Temporary)
- b) OR the Integrated Library and Online Search Mode



Be careful: focus your search, do not bring in too many references at a time.


First check to see if special connection files (.enz = connection file) for Luther Seminary are in your Connections folder.

Next, go to **Tools --> Online** search and add new connection files to your options. In future you can use the **Online Search** quick links.





#### How To Use EndNote & Word • Cite While You Write (CWYW)


Both Word and Endnote need to be open. Check to see if your EndNote tab (toolbar) is visible in Word.



Become familiar with the buttons used to **manage**, **edit**, and **update** your citations.

### **Footnotes are** a multi-step process.

- 1) Create the footnote space in Word. There are three ways to do this.
  - a) Keyboard shortcut: Ctrl+Alt+F
  - b) References—> Insert Footnote
  - c) Use the Icon on Word 2010's Quick Access Toolbar
- 2) Got to your EndNote library, select a citation (it will be highlighted in blue) and *insert* your data using the icon with the curved red arrow.








Your footnote will appear at the bottom of your page. At the same time a bibliography entry will appear at the end of your document. Endnote automatically creates, alphabetizes, and keeps track of your citation data. You can move footnotes around if you need to.

### **Page Numbers**

To add page numbers to a footnote first *insert* your cursor in the citation. It should be a light grey. Click on the icon for Edit & **Manage Citations.** Type your page number into the dialog box that opens.<sup>2</sup>





## Fixing, Correcting, & Adding Data

You **CANNOT** correct errors in your Word document (footnotes or bibliography). You **MUST** correct them in your EndNote Library. Word will check with your library and make the changes. Sometimes you may need to click on the icon for Update Citations and **Bibliography** to see the corrections.<sup>3</sup>

#### **Bibliographies**

There is a way to quickly create a bibliography in Word using your Endnote Library.

Choose your sources: **Ctrl** + **click** (selected resources) **OR Shift** + **click** (all resources between)

Edit —> Copy Formatted OR Ctrl + K —> Copy Formatted OR Right click: Copy Formatted.

Paste into a Word document. Type "Bibliography" and you are finished!
